

Note from our CEO

This year more than 100 lost, stray and abandoned pets came through our doors each week. The first full year in the Animal Care Centre has allowed us to rehabilitate even more sick and debilitated pets with 2,894 cats, dogs and rabbits adopted into safe and happy homes.

We didn't rest on our laurels though and were able to launch some incredible new programs during the year to ensure we can continue to deliver on our mission of connecting pets, people and community.

On Thursday 24 March 2022 we held our first AWL Giving Day where everyone that donated on the day had their donation matched by some of our generous donors. There were many beautiful comments throughout the day and we raised a phenomenal \$280,000...

In April 2022 we introduced a new cat behaviour program, called HET, for timid cats that are showing signs of socialisation. With the help of our amazing foster care volunteers, we place these cats in a home environment to give them a chance to come out of their shell before making them available for adoption. The program is proving very successful and 36 have graduated so far.

In May 2022 we opened the Edinburgh North shelter for cat adoptions providing a vital additional adoption site with 119 cats and kittens adopted in the first two months.

We were very excited to be showcased in the filming of For the Love of Pets this year-an eight-part docuseries following the stories of the staff, volunteers and animals at AWL and Vets4Pets in Adelaide. From vets performing life changing

surgeries to our shelter team working tirelessly to care for thousands of pets per year – the series which will air on Channel 9, will offer a rare glimpse into the hard work and dedication of those who protect and care for our furry friends.

Throughout the year we continued informing the public about responsible pet ownership as a valuable step on our journey towards a South Australia where every pet has a loving home. Our pet desexing campaign started in June 2022 and has seen a staggeringly positive response from the community so far with a reach of more than 1 million people.

Our Boarding enterprise continued to be affected by COVID-19 uncertainty resulting in a \$90k net deficit from a 62% occupancy for the year. Our Thrift Shop enterprise recorded a \$48k net surplus from \$390k of total sales while our Pet Cremations enterprise revenue increased by 17% and achieved a record number of 10,679 private cremations.

Every day I am inspired by the unwavering commitment of AWL team members to provide care to the lost, stray and abandoned animals of South Australia, and our amazingly dedicated volunteers who consistently go the extra mile to improve the welfare and quality of life for all pets. However, none of this could have been achieved without the South Australian community, and we owe a considerable debt of gratitude to all of our supporters and bequestors who donated so generously to AWL this year.

Finally I would like to extend my thanks to the outgoing Chair, Steven Weinert. Over the last six years, Steven has tirelessly given his time, resources, extensive knowledge and expertise to AWL and has been integral to the success of the organisation. From everyone at AWL, thank you very much.



Improved cats and dogs lives in the community

Why desexing your pet is so important

Gertrude is a very sweet, older Maltese that came into the clinic for a HUGE surgery. Gertrude had been found by the council wandering at large and when she came to AWL she had many medical issues including severe dental disease, a left ear infection, a tumour on her tongue, an umbilical hernia and a mammary tumour.

She underwent surgery for her dental disease and needed 7 teeth extractions, an ear flush, an umbilical hernia repair, and both her mammary tumour and tongue tumour were removed. During her desexing surgery she was also found to have a large tumour on her uterus and cysts on her ovaries. All tumours were removed and sent for histopathology and it was an anxious wait by the team for her results. Thankfully all of the tumors came back as non-cancerous and Gertrude recovered amazingly.

Getrude is yet another great example of why desexing your pets can be so important. If Gertrude was desexed early, she may not have developed these tumours that have put her health at risk.

No matter their age, the vet team will always do their best to provide the utmost care to our animals.

Best practice animal care, opportunities, treatment and rehabilitation

Connor arrived at the Wingfield shelter in a shopping bag

A kind member of the public found Connor, who had been hit by a car and brought him to AWL. Connor couldn't stand up, was unable to use his left front leg, had dried blood caked all over his face and was breathing very rapidly. Dr Bryan and Vet Nurse Jess worked quickly to give him first aid.

Despite the tremendous amount of pain he must have been in on arrival, Connor head bumped and snuggled with everyone he met. Connor responded well to the initial emergency stabilisation and the vet team were able to get x-rays which miraculously showed no fractures of his legs. However Connor had suffered a nasty fracture of his hard palate and his upper canine teeth were also broken. Once he was stabilised Connor was transferred to one of our emergency vet clinic partners for overnight observation.

Connor made gradual improvements every day under the watchful eye of the vet team. He slowly began to regain the function to his left front leg and despite his fractured hard palate he began eating on his own. A week after commencing treatment he was ready to go into foster care to finish his recovery before being adopted by Vet Nurse Jess.





Opal was brought into our Edinburgh North shelter in January as a stray with her four gorgeous three-day-old kittens, all girls. Every year we receive numerous requests to help mums and kittens just like her who need a safe haven to look after their babies and get ready for a new life.

After a couple of days' rest in our shelter and the relevant vet checks, the new mum and kittens were ready to be placed with a foster carer, who would look after Opal and help her raise her kittens in a safe environment, until they were big enough to be adopted.

As mum was named Opal, her kittens were named after gemstones – Ruby, Sapphire, Emerald and Jade. Within a couple of weeks, their eyes opened, their ears opened, they started crawling, then walking and their personalities started to show and before we knew it they were all ready for adoption.

We are so blessed to have amazing volunteers who help foster animals every day – opening their hearts, homes and lives to animals in need.

Financial Report

Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income

AWL's operational income improved from last year by \$816k predominately due to increases in revenue from Pet Cremations (\$477k) and Pet Boarding (\$85k) and Council Services (\$231k). Legacies and bequests from our generous supporters continued to fund our vital work, with AWL receiving \$3.7 million for the financial year.


There was a net deficit of \$2.71m for the year, however this was primarily due to:

- year end accounting adjustments related to the revaluation of aged buildings
- increased depreciation costs as a result of the construction of the Animal Care Centre
- cessation of the Federal Governments Job Keeper program

Our boarding enterprise continued to be affected by COVID-19 uncertainty resulting in \$90k net deficit from a 62% occupancy for the year. Our Thrift Shop enterprise recorded \$48k net surplus from \$390k of total sales while our Pet Cremations enterprise continued to maintain its market share and grow its financial contribution to AWL and recorded a net surplus of \$731k from a record number of 10,679 private cremations.

Statement of Financial Position

AWL's financial position continues to remain stable and sustainable with net assets remaining at \$41m, no debt, and a low level of current liabilities.
